In the last edition of the club newsletter Jason Hanscom asked "Why do you build what you build?" Well, here you go Jason.

When I was a kid all my heroes were race car drivers, but equally important to me were their race cars! My first awareness of racing was seeing Glenn 'Fireball' Roberts on TV in the Daytona 500. Sadly his nickname was predictive of his fate as he died in a fiery crash in 1963. But soon I had a new hero as Jim Clark showed up at Indianapolis driving a mid-engine race car designed and built by Colin Chapman's Lotus race cars. Clark won the race in 1965 and for the next decade the pace of innovation at Indy was spectacular. My auto racing imagination was energized.

Having become a Jim Clark fan I started to follow him on the World Championship F1 circuit, and a love for F1 followed. My Mom took me to see the movie 'Grand Prix' on the giant Boston Cinerama screen. WOW!

Meanwhile, Ford was kicking Ferrari's arse at LeMans and I was soon a fan of sports car racing as well. The CanAm series was spectacular with radical Chaparrals and ground-pounding McLarens bellowing around race courses. Domestic manufacturers competed against one another with 'pony cars' in the TransAm. All of it seemed so exotic, sophisticated and thrilling! By the mid 1970s I had seen nitro Funny Cars and Top Fuel dragsters. Total insanity! The noise, speed and fumes were intoxicating.

I had a fantastic notion of living the touring drag racers lifestyle as they barnstormed from match-race to match-race. For sure it wasn't as glamorous a life as I fantasized. Ed's Car Motorcycle Corner: Hasegawa FRS HONDA RS250RW by Ed Doering

After World War 2, in 1949, the F.I.M.

(Federation International Motorcycliste) got together to form a series of motorcycle races on Europe's demanding race circuits. Thru the years since 1949, the World Championship Grand Prix Series has grown to what is now called MOTOGP.

The original series contested bikes from many European manufacturers, in several engine size classes, with the 500cc class being the pinnacle of motorcycle racing for many years, up to the transition to MOTOGP.

One of the most hotly-contested of the many World Championship Series classes was the popular 250cc class. With bikes from many manufacturers thru-out Europe and the advent of Japanese water-cooled, 250cc 2-stroke engines, the class featured bikes that were very evenly matched. It, thus, became a matter of rider skill, power-to-weight ratio, and engine performance.

Thru-out many seasons, the 250cc class became a stepping stone for riders who ultimately wanted to race in the premiere 500cc class. Many future world champions cut their teeth and honed their riding skills in the extremely close battles within the 250cc class. Oftentimes those awesome wheel-to-wheel battles featured Japanese machinery produced by Yamaha and Honda

Honda's nimble and ultra-fast RS250RWs became the bike to beat for many seasons, and up to the sad demise of the 250cc class, in favor of 4-stroke 600cc machines as the new stepping stone to the MOTOGP class, the Honda NSR250 and RS250RW will go down in motorcycle racing history as one of the most dominant bikes in the World Championship Series.

In the 1980s, Tamiya took note of the immensely popular World Motorcycle Championship Series and listened to the many requests for the model company to produce detailed scale replicas of the most popular bikes of the 1980s era. That included 1/12th scale models of the Honda and Yamaha teams in the 250cc class, which soon became the preferred scale for race bike models. This scale is not too large and not too small. It renders a bike model of about 6.5" in length – just right!

Recently however, Hasegawa, another great model company well known for their extremely detailed military kits, took a good look at the modern RS250RW Honda and decided to follow Tamiya's lead and produce several replicas of bikes that competed in the 2000 era of the World Championship Grand Prix Series.

Let's take a look at one of these recent Hasegawa Honda RS250RW kits: I'm going to examine kit #21704, which replicates the flashy 'FRS' team bike. The kit features crisply printed, glossy Cartograph decals, the industry standard these days, to produce the bike in the 'FRS' colors of grey, light green/aqua and white, making for a very eye catching model.

However...if the 'FRS' team bike is not to your liking, don't fret! By simply going to Ebay and typing in "Hasegawa Honda

250 1/12" you'll find other bikes in Hasegawa's Honda NSR250 series of kits plus a list of colorful aftermarket decals for many other team options.

Another very colorful of these Hasegawa NSR250 and RS250RW Honda kits is kit # 21702 (another Limited Edition kit) which features markings for the strikingly colorful standout black and yellow bikes of the Scot Racing team, featuring decals for #55 – Yuki Takahashi or the very popular 250cc class rider, #4 – Andrea Dovizioso from the 2007 WGP series.

Upon opening the kit you'll find a typical fold-out instruction booklet with a complete history of the bike featured in the kit plus a sheet of illustrations for decal placements. There's also a complete depiction of the parts/trees layout comprising the kit as well as a complete paint chart for the colors needed for the model. Unfortunately, the chart calls for paints that are hard to find in the USA, but you can easily substitute Testors, Mr. Color, Model Master, Al-Clad and/or Metalizer colors instead.

The instructions are laid out in 17 assembly blocks with paint color notations for virtually every part in the kit. If parts need decal application in each assembly block they are well noted.

Assembly begins with the powerful 250cc motor. It is a water-cooled, 2-stroke, V-twin layout. The frontal frame piece includes the ram-air box and, of course, a detailed radiator.

Once the motor is complete it gets installed in a modern, stressed aluminum delta box section frame and, at this point, you will begin some of the application of the vinyl lines.

Progress moves on to assembly of the wheels and tires. Once the rear swing-arm is assembled, the two halves - frontal frame and swing-arm - are put together. The drive chain is added in this assembly block as well. A metal spring replicates the real spring on the mono-shock and stands out well in the frame assembly.

One next will move on to putting the expansion chamber exhaust pipes together with their stingers.

Moving on again, one tackles assembly of the front forks and front fender and, also, the routing of cables is included in this assembly block.

The gas tank is made up of four parts. Careful gluing and filling of seams must be completed here, as well as for the two parts making up the rear seat. Once those are on the model, one can attach the foot-pegs, gear shifter, brake pedals, throttle, handgrips, etc. Final routing of cables is depicted in this assembly block as well.

Finally, one completes the windscreen to upper fairing and belly fairing to complete the model.

Like Tamiya bike kits, the Hasegawa kit gives you thin vinyl lines to replicate fuel, brake, clutch, throttle cables and lines. Tweezers should be used to connect the lines to appropriate parts. There is a sizing guide in the assembly blocks informing you at what length to cut the lines.

In keeping with the same scheme as used by Tamiya, a long metal screw attaches the rear swing-arm to the main frame.

Real rubber tires are included. All they need is a light sanding or scuffing to give the tire its raced-on appearance. Every kit part is extremely well cast, with exacting details -incredible!

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Aerodynamic fairing pieces are included. The bike can be assembled with the fairings on or off. In my opinion, it's a shame to cover up all that great frame and motor detail so I'd leave the side and belly fairing off to show the details. I also suggest you leave the seat cowling and upper fairing with the windscreen on.

While it's not absolutely necessary, some knowledge of how motorcycles are built/laid-out is helpful, especially as related to running the lines and cables. But, if you CLOSELY follow the instructions, you'll do OK.

There are several good books you can find on Amazon.com, showing exacting details of modern MOTOGP and WGP series bikes. A good source is the annual MOTORCOURSE books, available from:

These kits are challenging at, about, Skill Level 3 or 4. Careful assembly will produce a very stunning, well-detailed replica of the dominant Honda RS-250-RW.

Kit Review: Honda CR-X Tuner by Guil Rosa

Fujimi Just Tuning Honda CR-X Del Sol SiR -

1/24 scale (Series Number 13, Kit #18205) from 1994
This curbside model kit from Fujimi is very nice and it can be used as a 'quick build' without worrying about adding too many details (ends up that I added some). This is part of the 'Just Tuning' series of model kits produced with a few extra

many details (ends up that I added some). This is part of the 'Just Tuning' series of model kits produced with a few extra parts for 'tuning' the model along with most parts to build a factory stock Honda CR-X Del Sol SiR (but not all the parts needed for a factory stock build: you will need tires to fit the factory stock wheels). Also, you can choose between left-hand drive and right-hand drive dashboard and windshield wipers.

The body is one piece and molded in red hard plastic that is harder than that used by American model kit companies. The chassis is one piece of black plastic with separated front and rear suspension parts and half of the exhaust pipes. The black interior is also one piece with separated seats, two options of dashboard (left and right) with parking brake, automatic transmission shift and a two-part rearview mirror along with a couple of extra parts for customizing such as a CD changer, telephone and other parts that I did not bother to use.

Unfortunately there are no brake and gas pedals! I had to use some left over 1967 Camaro pedals here. I had to fill the back side of the seats with Evergreen plastic sheet and putty.

I wanted to build it with the option of taking the top off like the real car and Fujimi shows in the instructions how and where to make the cuts. Anyways, after cutting the top, I had to use a little bit of Evergreen plastic sheet to compensate for the loss of material and fill the gap created by the cut kerf. I also added a strip of Evergreen plastic in between the 'B' pillars to simulate the gasket that seals the area and two 1 mm diameter Neodymium Magnets to hold the top in place. The windows are made of two clear parts and the one-piece windshield and the side and rear window as another piece. I did not use the latter and replaced it with a clear sheet of plastic for the rear window only.

When test fitting, I noticed that the suspension was too high, almost like one used on a SUV. But that was an easy fix, since the brake discs were molded with the shock absorber was one piece, I cut them and cemented them back closer to the center of the discs, I also added material inside the suspension arms to compensate for this.

The interior was painted in semi-gloss black, sky grey and a few details done in light green. I also added seat belts and grey flocking. I had to use some spare dashboard dial decals to replace the older Fujimi ones. On the body, after I cleaned up the molding lines, etc., I used a little piece of Bare Metal Foil over the 'H' molded-in logo on the front and rear. After primer, I painted the body with Tamiya's Silver Leaf and Candy Lime Green. With all that done, I went back to the 'H' molded in logos and rubbed them with a cotton swab and 91% Isopropyl Alcohol until the Bare Metal Foil shows up again.

After that was done, it was time for a clear coat on everything. I used more Bare Metal Foil on the front and rear lights, including the brake light. For the three mirrors I used Hasegawa's Mirror Surface Finish. I added a honeycomb mesh behind the front grille to help hide the empty space there (remember there is no engine). I masked the entire body to be able to paint the 'rubber' areas with semi-gloss black.

The final steps were as follows: complete the chassis installing the exhaust bits, suspension and wheels/tires, followed by mating the interior and chassis together with the body. The very last bits were the front of the chassis, rearview mirrors, windshield wipers, license plates and rear wing. Thanks, Guil













Kit Review: Moebius 1972 Ford F250 Ranger XLT


The Moebius 1972 F250 Ranger XLT with snow plow, kit # 2568 (Skill level: 3), is a fantastic kit. Everything fits very well and is well detailed.


Like most of the Moebius truck kits, the hood was warped. I was able to straighten it using the 'hot water' method. If you aren't able to straighten yours, you can reach out to Moebius and they will send you a replacement hood. The snow plow is very nicely detailed and includes poseable 'up' and 'side to side' options.

Directions are very nice and easy to read with colored pictures of the built model. You also get a factory paint color chart and how to correctly lay out the factory two-tone options. You'll find the plow has its own detailed instructions.

Overall it's a fantastic kit that I highly recommend. Until next time, have fun at the bench. Jason









Aoshima Chevy Cruze (1.6T) 2013 WTCC Kit Number – 05/B-24003/082997 3800 by Ed Doering

For many years, model car builders have often wondered "What if?". What if a well-respected, internationally known Japanese company, of Tamiya-like quality, were to produce a kit of an American car? For years, we've asked Tamiya to consider doing an American NASCAR kit, but to no avail.

Recently, while reading thru the monthly newsletter produced by the GTR, I discovered a short blurb about a new 1/24 kit produced by the Japanese company – Aoshima. Ever since Ford Motor Company decided to enter the grueling and demanding World Rallye Championship with their Ford Focus (and doing extremely well with it at that), considerable attention has been placed on American cars by Japanese companies.

The GTR blurb I read went on to say that Aoshima had just released a kit of the 2013 LUKOIL Chevrolet Cruze from the World Touring Car Championship. Excited, I went looking to see if there was any way to obtain this kit short of having to get one out of Japan. The kit is actually made in Japan by Aoshima but distributed via its distributor – Beemax, out of Macau. Hunting on the Internet located the kit and I soon ordered it. It's not cheap, but then what kit is cheap these days? You can acquire one from a U.S. distributor for about \$39, thru: http://www.hobbypreorders.com/1-24-aoshima-chevrolet-cruze-2012-wtcc-world-champion-rally-race/

Additionally, one may get the kit from M&S Hobbies, in the USA. (http://www.mshobbies.com)

Let's examine the kit: The kit gives you the decal option for the white, red, and gold LUKOIL car. Decals themselves are in full register, glossy and crisply printed by Cartograph, (the industry standard these days, found in all hi-quality kits) and include all markings for the option. There are three sheets of decals enclosed in a clear envelope for safe keeping.

A chart is given showing all the paint colors needed for this model. Unfortunately, it calls out 'Mr. Color' paints, which are hard to locate in the USA, but it's easy to find alternative paints for the colors needed using Testor's, Model Master, Humbrol, Metalizer or Tamiya paints.

On the back of the instruction booklet, is a detailed parts layout for the seven trees that comprise the makeup of the kit. Each tree is in a clear protective bag. You also get a small fret of photo-etch parts and wire mesh for the grille openings. A sheet of masking seals, of the same quality as Tamiya, is included for masking off of the window frames. Tires are real rubber low profile racing slicks. There's also a tree of chrome-plated parts for the headlights. Chrome parts are extremely well done – bright and shiny.

The front page of the instruction booklet gives a short, but detailed analysis of the history of the car. The only downside to this kit, like many Japanese kits, is that the kit does not include the 1.6 liter, turbo-charged, 4-cylinder motor. What a shame! Thus, the car becomes a racing curbside model.

Construction covers 16 assembly blocks and begins with the chassis plate then the front suspension. Nice coil-over shocks, and disc brakes, with detailed calipers, are included. The front and rear suspension pieces are all well molded in detail. A very nice exhaust pipe and muffler can are added too.

The small P/E fret includes buckles for a full shoulder harness and lap belt. Instructions call for using thin paper for the webbing material of the belt straps and a guide for cutting the proper lengths is included. But...for those lacking good P/E skills, Aoshima has you covered with some really nice decals to replicate the harness. For those who would prefer gluing in a plastic harness, simply pick up AMT's 1956 Ford, or 1964 Mercury Marauder kits. A great set of plastic belts is in those kits that will fill the bill.

The seat itself is of the modern body forming type with Hahn-device headrest and side of the head protection. A fire retardant tank and some nice electronics boxes, which get decals, make up detailing in the driver compartment. P/E straps are included to wrap around the retardant tank. The interior floor pan features wiring that can be picked out with good detail painting. Pedals and shifter linkage are included, as well as inner door side panels. A simple racing dash, with steering column and wheel as well as a decal for the instrument panel all make for a nice race interior.

A multi-point full roll cage, with detailed padding and padding clamps is sharply rendered. Aoshima sells a separate detail set depicting a window net. It's a shame it's not included with the kit. One could easily cut one out from a modern NASCAR kit's body and adapt it to the Cruze body.

The car features a rear-mounted wing on the trunk; P/E end plates are included for that.

The window glass is flawless, very clean, clear bright plastic. All one needs to do is use the given masks and you can easily paint the black window frames.

Construction moves to the body itself; and it is a gorgeous one. It is the 4-door Cruze. Very crisply molded, in precise dimensions, and captures the shape of the Cruze perfectly. It's well in scale. The nose of the body is a separate piece. Inspection of this body showed no flash, no mold seam lines, and a good grade of styrene plastic used. The Body is not too thin or thick.

Detailing the rear lights with clear red, etc., finishes the body work and only gluing on the side mirrors and their lenses will complete the construction blocks, along with adding the P/E wiper blades and a chin air dam. The wheels in this kit are exceptional as well and mount on very realistic race slicks.

One then moves on to final decaling. The car's paint scheme is white, red and gold as depicted via the good box art. I'm certain good reference shots of the car also exist on the 'Net helping one to determine what type of paints to use.

The World Touring Car Championship is gaining in popularity worldwide, with TV coverage now via cable in the USA. Aoshima has done an extremely exceptional job on this WTCC Chevy Cruze and one can only hope this Japanese company may do more American cars.

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Aftermarket decal sets, now available thru M&S Hobbies, already exist if you do not want to build the car with the kit-given decal set. On a scale of 1-10, definitely a 10! It is very different and interesting subject matter which I highly recommended. ED




