#### Kit Review: Jaguar XJR-9LM by Guil Rosa

Jaguar XJR-9LM, Tamiya 1/24 scale (kit #24084) I cannot start this article without expressing my gratitude to be a member of this great model club called Classic Plastic. The class of people in this club is very high and I will never forget the words Del Paone said to me: "joining this club was the Best decision you've ever made". Indeed, he was right.

Last December I 'celebrated' my 10th anniversary since I joined the club and it was at the December meeting back in 2017 when Dave Perkins came in and showed me this 1/24 scale model kit of the Jaguar XJR-9LM from Tamiya. He said "What do you think of it?" I opened the box and looked inside, the parts were there all in their bags, along with some goodies, carbon fiber decal set, aftermarket decals for the 'Silk Cut', two photo-etch detail sets, one from Studio 27 and another from Scale Motorsport and last, but not least, a can of Tamiya Lavender, the color recommended by Tamiya to paint the model kit. I looked at him and said, "You have a serious project here!" and he replied "It's for you. I don't have the time to build it."

And here we go! After some time to collect information, reference pictures and a must needed 'Profile' booklet that shows all Jaguar systems in detail, I felt confident I could start this project. Since day one, my goal was to do my best and to give the finished model back to Dave. I cannot fail!

One of the first things I finished was the wheels and tires. I added Top Studio Air Valves on each of them, and later at final assembly, I added photo-etch nuts and safety locks.

The cockpit interior was the next step. After painting it semi-gloss black, I started to apply the carbon fiber decals from the Scale Motorsport set on the racing seat. I removed the molded-in seatbelts and painted it with Scale Motorsport black Faux Fabrix textured paint (#5503). I finished up the seat adding aftermarket blue seat belts. The dashboard received several Top Studio toggle switches, rivet heads and instrument decals. On the top of the dashboard I used a black felt-like self-adhesive paper. I finished up the interior with some braided lines and AN fittings.

Chassis preparation was next. I painted it semi-gloss black except the front where I paint it British racing green. After the paint dried, I applied the carbon fiber decal and clear coated it with flat clear.

Body parts were next. I used Zero Paints white and Silk Cut Purple. I wasn't confident that the decals I had for the purple areas would work and, since I had to paint some areas, I decided to give it a try masking and painting all of them. Luck was on my side and it worked out just fine. It was time to apply the decals all around. To finish with the body parts, I used Gaiacolor EX-03 gloss. With all that done and the body parts polished, I installed the windows, headlights and taillights. I painted the inside of the body parts with Valejo flat black. I used Bare Metal Foil for the heat shields. The dreaded moment was right in front of me; it was time to start to detail the engine bay area. I started with the bits I had to scratch build such as the water cooling lines, that after several attempts and fails, I set it with styrene round rods, painted them silver and clear blue and set them aside. Next was the oil lines, I tried some different braided lines and I end up using mostly braided fishing lines (Dave likes to go fishing!) and Top Studio resin AN fittings. Here I took my time, weighing each next step before deciding what to do next to avoid unexpected surprises. I cut off the molded-in rear shock absorbers and replaced them with Top Studio shock absorbers.

Final assembly was almost a breeze, except the last bits as the photo-etch side skirts decided to test my patience at the last minute but in the end they cooperated.

Despite this project lasting two years, it was a blast to work on it. I fully enjoyed it and I am glad that I had the opportunity to build it for you, Mr. Perkins. Thank you! Take care all, stay safe and healthy. Guil

### Kit review: Mini Cooper

'California Wheels' Revell kit #85-4035, an original Mini Cooper, is an all-plastic model kit in 1/24<sup>th</sup> scale with approximately 124 pieces in white and chrome plastic with clear windows, headlights and taillights. I found this kit to be an easy kit to put together and I didn't lose any parts during assembly. Warning: many pieces are tiny! I am prone to dropping small parts under my work bench, but not this time so maybe this is a change for the better?

I spent some time reading the 16 page instruction manual which contains color coding and parts listings, tips on assembly and how to assemble the kit. This is a Skill Level 2 kit.

Everything went where it should and I found that this kit is fairly easy to assemble. My only complaint is that many parts are spread out over different sprues which make it difficult finding them. I had to search the different sprues looking for the part numbers (which are hard to see) and for the parts themselves. The sprues have been marked as A, B, C, etc., but they are not referenced in the instructions.

The parts have positive mounting locations. I spent the afternoon hand-painting the many parts for this kit and these are pieces I am not familiar with as this is a different vehicle for me. WARNING! Be very careful with part number 73 as I had lost mine when I removed it from the parts sprue. It is very, very tiny!!!

Be very careful when you mount the wheels. I broke the lower A-arm, drive shaft and steering linkage trying to mount the left front wheel. During final assembly, I had noticed that the rear side windows had to be trimmed for a better fit. And this kit had four gas caps and I only needed one!

This is definitely not a muscle car, but a small car. If you want something different from your normal builds, try this one. Mike



#### Kit review: Honda CB400 Super 4 by Guil Rosa

Aoshima 1/12<sup>th</sup> scale Honda CB400 Super Four In the 1970's and 80's in Brazil, it was forbidden to import vehicles and many other manufactured goods. The reason behind this was to 'protect' Brazilian companies and the foreign ones already in the country. In the motorcycle industry, we had three companies located there: Honda, Yamaha and a Brazilian company called 'Amazonas'. Both Honda and Yamaha were basically producing 125cc motorcycles until Honda came with their beautiful CB400, and this is the motorcycle that I want to show you today.

The Aoshima kit consist of seven trees, one of them of clear parts, a basic decal sheet, two rubber-like tires, two springs, vinyl pipe and three screws. Two of the trees are chrome plated and the other one is black plastic.

Since this was my first attempt to build an Aoshima kit so I decided to follow the instructions step by step. On step one I started making holes on the disc rotors. Most of the chrome plated parts were stripped and painted with the appropriate color, on some, like the exhaust, I painted semi-gloss black.

After everything was painted, I started the subassemblies. The engine could not be assembled totally due to the way it is installed on the frame; again, I followed the instructions here. I painted the front mud guard, gas tank and rear body parts with Tamiya Pearl Yellow and clear coated them with Model Master Ultra Gloss Clear Coat. I used Bare Metal Foil on the front forks and behind the brake light lens. The decals were easy to apply and on the gauges I used the UV resin over them to make them look like lenses. I diverged from some of the final assembly instructions because it would make it a little harder to do if I had not.

This was a very nice kit to build with almost no problems and I would recommend it to anyone who is looking for an enjoyable and beautiful kit to build.

#### **Kit review: Racers Wedge** by Associate Treasurer Tim Rhine

Here is my review of the MPC (Round 2) 1972

Chevrolet Racers Wedge (or a pick up) 2-in-1 kit (Kit no.MPC885/12) which has been re-released for the first time since 1972. The pick up part of the kit has been reproduced many times over the years with different options and under other manufacturers (AMT/MPC) but this is the first time it has been reproduced with the Racers Wedge body.

Overall the moulds have held up good over time with very little flash evident. It has a new decal sheet and a choice of rims (I don't like either choice, but that's just my opinion).

There are not too many optional parts other than the Wedge or pick up bed. You do have a front grill choice. Only engine option is a stock Chevrolet 350ci power plant. It does come with some tools such as a vise, jack, gas can, fire extinguisher as well as a few other tools.


It's nice Round 2 is bringing back some of the long lost kits. I will be building mine as the pick up version.

Overall it's not a bad kit but nothing is special about it. It is more nostalgic than anything else and that'll be the reason most of us will buy it as it brings us back to being a kid again and for the day dreams of a simpler time in our lives

With all that, I had to do a serious detailing job all around it. Along with the two photo-etch sets and carbon fiber decal set, I added many other aftermarket bits and pieces. The paints I used were from Zero Paints, Alclad II and for clear I used Gaia Notes EX03 gloss. I decided not to apply the purple decals and painted the areas after a 'monstrous' masking job. Around the engine I scratch built most of the water cooling system, added the lubrication and fuel systems and replaced the rear shock absorbers for some made by Top Studio. The cockpit is completely detailed with carbon fiber decals, seat belt and many toggle switches. Mike Siesicki - Yodel Dodge Coronet with added twoway radio and emergency lights on the roof. Painted Tamiya TS-43 Racing Green with a Tamiya AS-15 Tan interior
