## Kit review: Fujimi Lamborghini Diablo by Tim Rhine

Here is my review of Fujimi's 1/24<sup>th</sup> scale Lamborghini Diablo (Kit no.126791) produced in 2016.

I picked this kit up on-line from www.plazajapan.com and they offer a great selection of Japanese kits.

The manufacturer doesn't give a part count but there seems to be about 80 to 90 parts included with the kit. Most parts are molded in white, clear (for the glass) and aluminum finish (for the rims and miscellaneous other parts). Rubber tires are included. Also included is a good set of decals with nice dash decals and window mask. There are a lot of small screws and a metal axle.

The only real problem, and for me it's a big problem, is that the instructions are in Japanese. It does have paint call outs but...not in English.

The nice thing I like about the kit is that it comes with prebent metal door hinges.


Expect the body to need a little 'clean up' of mould lines, but not too much. Use caution working with the body seems as they are very fragile.

Hopefully by the time you read this I will have finished the kit. If it's not finished then I'll post pictures in the next newsletter.

**Guest Columnist: Ed's Car Corner** Replica build and review of the Revell '57 Ford Custom 300 kit by Ed Doering

This build/car actually began with TWO of the recent Revell 1957 Ford Custom 300 kits - the recent 'Fireball' Roberts #22 kit PLUS the earlier release of the Revell 1957 Ford with the drag car, the 'Bent Eight' version.

The reason I had to use two kits is that by mid-season of 1957, the Automotive Manufacturer's Association (AMA) BANNED the use of super-charged or fuel-injected motor options in NASCAR and United States Auto Club (USAC) racing. USAC was the 'Northern version' of NASCAR and seeing as I wanted to construct a replica of Al Tasnady's #44 USAC car, I could NOT use the 'Fireball' kit's Paxton supercharger as I'd used on an earlier build of Marvin Panch's factory-backed #98 racer.

With the ban on Ford's motor with the Paxton super-charger, racers using Fords took a look at what Bill Stroppe was using on his factory-backed 1957 Mercury team's cars. Stroppe decided to use the 'E-Code' Ford option of a special dual 4-barrel intake manifold, with two 4-barrel carbs; and that's the option most Ford racers/drivers used in 1957 after the AMA ban. The 'Bent Eight' Revell kit HAS this correct 'E-Code' 312 'Y' Block Thunderbird engine package, so that's what I used on this build. I painted the motor block in Ford Engine Red, and using various shades of Metalizers, with some overcoating of base colors, I dry-brushed details on all the motor parts before assembly, and added the kit's special Thunderbird logo decals to the valve covers.

I was a bit disappointed in that the kit's 1950s era exhaust manifolds fit so tightly to the motor's cylinder heads, that drilling holes for plug wiring was next to impossible, so I did not wire this motor. However...I did add the kit's nice fuel lines to the two carbs.

While most builders paint race car frames in a shade of black, I wanted to be a bit different and used a military flat gray color for my frame pan, leaving the actual frame rails in black, and over-coating over my base colors with Metalizers. I prefer this technique to using washes - much easier.

The interior features a nice cut-down seat, complete with a side bolster. I added shoulder harness and lap belts from the AMT 1964 Mercury Marauder kit, plus the kit's simple, loop roll bar. The kit features nice, grey upholstery decals for the seat, & side door panels, so added that, plus gauge decals in the dash. A more modern Monogram NASCAR kit provided a fire bottle, rear end cooler/blower and driver's water tank. Using some thin-gauge coated wire, I added the drinking hose to the water tank.

Wheels & tires are from Plastic Performance Products. NASCAR and USAC did not have a true 'racing' tire in 1957. Drivers instead used Goodyear or Firestone Heavy Duty truck tires and that's what I used mounted on Holman-Moody wheels. I cut off the rearmost portions of the stock exhaust system, bent the remainders out sideways and drilled out the ends of the exhaust pipes to resemble racing exhaust dumps. The headlight and tail light covers come in the kit. Using a simple punch, I punched out a small disc from sheet plastic and made a gas cap.

To prevent the sun's glare from affecting the driver's vision, racers used to tape off an anti-glare panel on the windshield. So, using aluminum Pactra Trim Tape, to resemble Duct Tape, I added the anti-glare panel to my windshield.

Decals were obtained from an on-line EBAY 'store' named 'SLOT CAR FEVER' and are laser/ALPS printed type decals which are very thin and primarily intended to be used over white or very light paint colors. They 'laid down' perfectly, without the use of any decal setting solutions. This 'store' features literally 100s of 1940s to the present racing decals.

This build represents the #44 car Al Tasnady drove in a 1957 USAC Late Model Stock Car race, at my 'home track' - the famous 'Milwaukee Mile', held during the annual August Wisconsin State Fair. My Grandpa and Dad saw this car race, as they annually attended all the USAC races during 'Fair Week'. The car was owned, built and maintained by the Hanchick & Lerch Racing Team, with sponsorship from Clinton Auto Parts and Wargo Motors.

Paint is well-thinned Testors Classic White and Guard's Red and, as noted earlier, Metalizers were used thru-out the build. There is no clear coat on this model. Instead, I just polished out the paint using Novus polish and Dry-Wash.

Anyway, the new Revell kit assembled without any major fit issues. Parts were flash free and free of unsightly mold lines or any predominant ejector pin marks. Revell did an outstanding job on this kit - highly recommended!
