Club president Paul Anagnostopoulos was led astray by personal affairs and has adjourned his column until the next newsletter so I've decided, as club Vice President, to fill in for him this issue.

First, I'd like to congratulate and thank all members for their efforts leading to what was another great show this past October 6th. Plenty of hard work goes on both behind the scenes and on show day to make this event happen. Luckily, we have many generous people associated with our club who gladly donate their time and lend a helping hand. Know that your efforts are greatly appreciated.

I also want to thank Heather Hanscom and Tammy Baril for taking time out of their weekend to help us at the registration desk, which is arguably the most complicated aspect of our show. Your skills made show registration easy for all.

As many of you are aware, inflation has affected all aspects of our life. Regarding our newsletter, this is most evident in the price of postage, which has risen five times since 2020 and is proposed to rise five more times over the next three years. Currently, it costs us close to \$5 per newsletter to print and mail each one – and that cost has been kept low because Paul A prints them and only charges for ink/toner used. If we had to print newsletters at a commercial business we'd be looking at \$14 - \$16 per newsletter – just ridiculous.

Last year we began to limit the number of printed and mailed newsletters. We continued to hand out a printed copy of the full newsletter to club meeting attendees and supplied those not attending with a 'pdf' copy via email, asking those folks to only request a printed/mailed version if they really felt they needed one (some of us old guys have issues reading documents off a computer or cell phone screen) and that has somewhat reduced our costs. We've discontinued sending a free printed copy to local hobby shops and club 'friends', instead offering an alternate to view the next issue from our club website posting. Currently we average mailing out 10 to 12 newsletters each issue. But it's time to do more.

To help control rising production costs we are, beginning with this newsletter, limiting the size of the printed version to 12 pages or less with an extended size pdf version created and emailed to all club members immediately after our meeting. All printed versions (meaning both those handed out at club meetings and those later mailed to non-attendees who request a printed copy) will be the reduced size version.

Beginning with this issue you'll notice a 'continued on' note at the end of those articles and photo sections which continue into the extended version pages. Understand that we're trying this to help keep membership costs down but please let me know if you believe we should continue to print the entire newsletter for club members.

As we've done in the past, Paul A will continue to post the extended version newsletter on our club website a few days before the following club meeting. We delay posting it to assure all club members have had the opportunity to read the latest newsletter before the general public can view it. Thanks,

PatCon 2024 show review

On Sunday September 15th the IPMS Patriot Chapter scale modelers held their annual show. This year they had a new exciting location: the American Heritage Museum in Hudson MA (located at 568 Main Street). I've provided the address just in case you would like to visit as it was a great setting and is a fantastic museum to visit on your own.

On to the show. I'm not sure how many models were displayed, I believe about 350 or so, but the car count was really low, I would say under a 100 in the automotive classes with most entries coming from Classic Plastic members. In all there were some very outstanding builds in all genres.

Ed's Car Corner: Tamiya Alfa Romeo 155 V6TI Kit number 24137 By Ed Doering

One of the most popular forms of racing in Europe is the German Touring Car Series, more commonly known as DTM. The series is second only to Formula One in Europe, with massive crowds showing up for the races. At Hockenheim, Germany as many as 250,000 rabid fans turned up to see the stars and cars of this exciting series.

Currently, there are three manufacturers involved in DTM – Audi, BMW and Mercedes. But, not too long ago, in the 1990s, Opel and Alfa Romeo were involved, with Alfa Romeo taking a DTM title.

Alfa Romeo enjoyed a spectacular season in the 1993 series with their formidable 155 V6 TI. This highly sophisticated race car was derived from the 4-wheel drive 155 GTA, which raced in the 1992 Italian Supertourismo Series.

The 155 V6 TI, introduced in 1993, incorporated a newly developed 2.5 liter V6 engine capable of 420 horsepower at an amazing 11,800rpm. The engine was matched to a race-proven, full-time 4-wheel drive system for stable handling. In addition, the 50-50 front/rear torque split ratio adjusted automatically according to track, speed, and tire wear conditions.

The standard MacPherson strut suspension system featured lightweight and durable materials, and had a refined geometry. The lightweight body work, although resembling the appearance of the street-version car, was constructed almost entirely of Carbon Kevlar composite material.

Alfa Romeo entered four 155s during the 1993 German Touring Car Series, including two from the official factory-backed Alfa Corse team. Driven by former Formula One drivers Nicola Larini and Alessandro Nannini, they immediately established themselves as a championship contender, and eventually won the coveted DTM title.

I received this kit during a Christmas gift exchange with Al Jones last year. I figure it's time to take a look at this kit. Actually, this kit's a re-issue of the original Tamiya kit released in 1994. The only difference between the 1994 release and this new issue is that you now get Cartograph decals. The decals in the older kit were overly thin and would easily break or curl up on you. So, the Cartograph decals are a very welcome enhancement. The rest of the kit's exactly the same as the original release.

The kit comes in the traditional rectangular tray type box most Tamiya kits come in. The side panels of the box feature different views of the car from all angles, to aid in decal placement along with the placement guide given with the instruction booklet.

There is no skill level listed for this kit, but I would rate it as Skill Level 3, because of the high detail. A child of about 12 would be able to build this kit, along with some help from dad, an older sibling, or an advanced builder.

All of the parts trees come bagged, to include a grey-silver tree containing the frame pan, roll cage, brakes, door panels and some of the engine parts. The black tree holds the wheels, some interior parts, two steering wheels, for either the Nannini or Larini car, and suspension parts. A small red tree has the frontal air dam, exhaust pipes, mirrors, and body vents. The tires are real rubber racing slicks. There is one clear tree holding the windows. The windows are a one-piece unit, and are easily inserted into the body, which is very well cast, in scale, and meets the proportions of the real car. The clear tree also holds the headlamp and tail light pieces.

The body is cast in a dark red plastic, which is wrong. The real cars had a bright red color, similar to Ferrari Red. Tamiya fortunately makes an Italian Red in their spray can line, and for those who airbrush with bottle paints, Model Master also has an Italian Red.

Decals enable you to build either the Larini or Nannini driven cars, with the official Alfa Corse team markings, featuring the trademark cross and snake Alfa logos.

For those who want to build a different version of an Alfa Romeo 155 V6 TI, go to Strada Sports, or hunt on the Net for Studio 27's decal # ST27-/DC777/1600, which will allow you to build the red #10 or #0 cars, with the famous AGIP logos.

In the Tamiya kit, stickers are given for the heat shields at the rear of the car. The exhaust system features flip-up muffler cans, and escaping gas fumes throw heat to the back of the car – thus, the heat shields. The Tamiya decal sheet also has a carbon fiber decal for the seat, and lap belt and shoulder harness decals – a nice touch!

Within the Studio 27 decal sheet, you get photo-etch heat shields, which will look better than the stickers given in the Tamiya kit. There are no chrome parts in this kit.

The instruction booklet is large and folds out easily. There are 20 assembly blocks for building this kit. Each block has you glue up no more than five parts per block, making for ease of assembly for either a child or older adult builder.

Assembly begins with the 2.5 liter V6 engine. It is extremely well cast with exacting detail. Paints are called out for each part, using Tamiya paints, but Model Master, Metalizer, or Al-Clad paints will do well too.

In Block 1, the exhaust headers and front axles are attached. Moving on to Block 2, the completed engine is installed into the frame pan, along with a cradle brace. Frontal areas on the frame pan, for the front wheel wells, are called out to be painted flat black.

Block 3 deals with attaching the exhaust pipes to the headers and adding the flip-up muffler cans. Be sure to get the muffler cans into their correct holes at the rear of the frame pan.

In Block 4, after all are detail painted, the rear uprights are attached to the rear brakes. Be sure to use the kit's polycaps, into which the wheel/tire assemblies are added.

Block 5 deals with building the rear axle assembly and rear suspension, as well as the front stabilizer and intake shrouds.

On to Block 6, where the completed rear axle unit, and rear uprights with their brakes are mounted to the rear of the frame.

Unfortunately we did forget to announce the award sponsors with each award, but the day goes by so fast some things slip your mind even as you're doing them. Next year we'll read off all sponsors names immediately before we start the announcing award winners.

Kit Review: Tamiya Alpha Romeo Giulia Sprint GTA

Here is my kit review of the Tamiya 1/24th scale Alfa Romeo Giulia Sprint GTA, kit number 24188*3200, released in 1997 and re-released in 2024.

The kit is molded in dark gray, red and chrome and comes with four rubber tires and a clear parts tree. It also has window masks and chrome transfers. It does not list a parts count but my guess is that it appears to contain 80 to 90 parts and does have full engine detail.

The kit has an average price of \$30.00, so I ordered two from Model Roundup

All the parts are of typical Tamiya quality and fashion - crisp and clean with no flash. The body is molded in red but that can be primed to accept whatever color you want to paint yours. There are only a few small mold lines on the body which can be easily cleaned up and they are not in 'noticeable' spots.

The kit states it can be built two ways: stock or street. I'm not sure what 'street' is...it looks like you would leave the bumpers off and add some yellow to the nose...? There are not any optional parts listed for the street version, so who knows. Overall it looks good and will be a fun build. I do recommend this kit. In case you are wondering I shook the box to see if it would assemble itself (some say Tamiya kits do that, haha).

I'm happy to report that it did not and that's good because I'm

looking forward to building the two kits I have. Until the next review, happy building and be safe.

Kit Review: EBBRO Citroen DS21 four door sedan

Here is my kit review of the EBBRO 1/24th scale Citroen DS21, a four door sedan, kit number 25009-8800.

This kit was re-issued in 2019 with new tooling; parts count info is not listed and it is molded in white, black, chrome and clear parts. The decal sheet is minimal but has what you need. Also supplied are five tires, total, and they are soft rubber.

The body looks real clean and will need very minimal clean up. The two front doors are made to open on this kit and there is a choice of wheels. A cool feature found on the real car is that the headlights turn along with the steering wheel, and the kit is designed to do the same! Very cool. Also, it does have a full engine and under hood detail.


I would say this is not a kit for a beginner. Overall it appears to be a nice, well detailed model kit. It will be a fun build and is on my work bench as I write this...and the build is under way.


I do recommend this kit but, as I said, is not for a beginner. Happy building and until the next kit review, be safe.

In Block 9, those front uprights, and the completed front underguard unit are mated to the frame.

Block 10 has you attach the engine injector funnels, some side braces on the front of the frame and the ram air intake box. You can elect to not glue the box to the funnels, so that you can lift it off to show your motor detail.

In Block 11 you deal with interior parts to include the seat after the belt decals are applied, the trunk separation wall, pedals, air jacks, shifter, and black electronics boxes.

The dash is assembled in Block 12, and the steering wheel. An instrument panel anti-glare shield is also glued onto the dash. Some detail painting will make the dash stand out.

In Block 13, you build the roll cage, and attach the completed dash to it, then mount these units to the frame pan.

In Block 14, all four wheel/tire assemblies get attached, along with the door panels.

Block 15 deals with preparing the body for painting. Once the body and hood are painted and dry, you may insert the one-piece windows unit into the body, and attach the side skirts.

In this Block 16 you are shown how to make and cut the stickers for the heat shields, and how and where to attach them at the rear of the car.

In Block 17, your completed frame assembly is inserted into the finished body. Note that the rear of the frame has to go into the body first. There are pins on the rear of the frame that go into holes in the rear of the body. Go slowly, and study the instructions to insure you don't break off the muffler cans.

Block 18 has you glue up the rear wing, and insert vents into the front air dam. A note/drawing shows how the vents must look after insertion in the air dam.

In Block 19, the hood, side mirrors, and air dam are glued to the finished body.

Block 20 has you add the completed rear wing, tail lights, tow hooks, and antennas. This completes all assemblies, and the completed model is now ready for decals. A placement guide is included on the back page of the instructions.

While at first look of the instructions, it may appear this kit is complicated, when in fact it's just a very detailed kit. Nothing in the assembly blocks is difficult. You only need to follow the instructions carefully, and the kit goes together with typical Tamiya precision fit of the parts.

I'm glad Tamiya is re-issuing these Alfa Romeo DTM cars. The orange Jagermeister, and white, blue, and red Martini Alfa kits are also re-issued. So, you have your choice of which kit to build. All are great kits, and I rate the kit a perfect 10, because of the relative ease of assembly, and exacting details thru-out the kit.
