Here is my review of the Moebius Pro Touring 1964 Mercury Comet. The kit's molded in gray with rubber tires, chrome and clear parts, and a minimal decal sheet (but it has what you'll need).

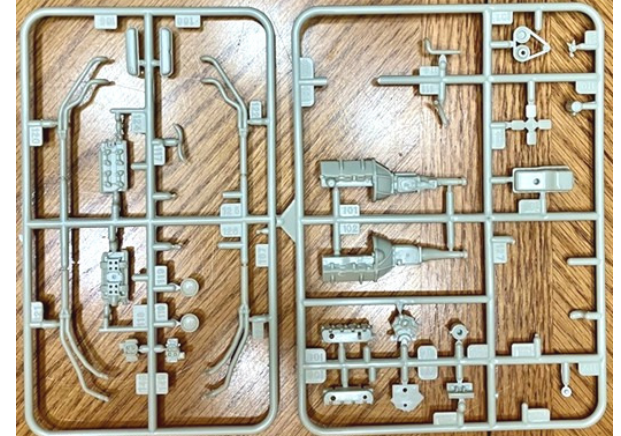
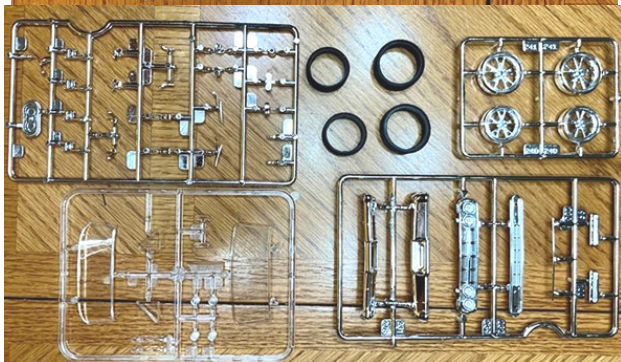
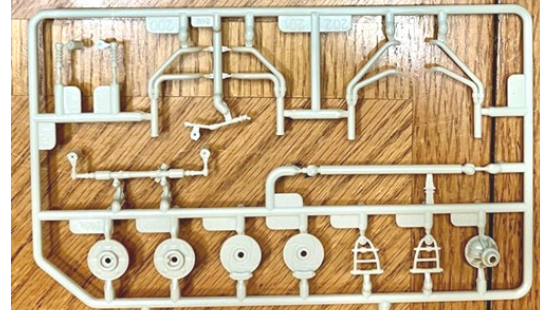
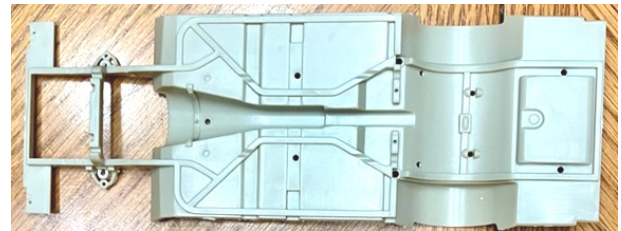
This kit can only be built as the pro touring car (and it's cool!). Note that there are a few versions of this car available from Moebius.

A few things I don't like about this kit - First: the glass goes in place from the outside so you have to be careful when painting to make sure you don't get too much paint build up else the glass will not fit properly. Second: Moebius kit instructions are just very difficult to understand.

Overall it looks to be a good kit and I do recommend it, for now...let's see how it builds up.

Baycon 2025 was held by the Bay Colony Modelers at the Franklin, MA Elks location again this year on November 2nd.

The layout was a little different than last year. All the vendors were in the smaller room. All the tables were against the walls. At times, it was rather crowded. If you are a car guy only, the selection was somewhat limited. There was a very good selection of military type kits.

The built models were displayed in the larger room and there seemed to be more space. There were over 300 models entered. The tables were mostly full, but not overly crowded. I thought one Auto category, might end up with not enough room, but that never happened. It is always interesting to see so many types of models: cars, trucks, motorcycles, airplanes, ships, tanks, helicopters, Gundams, figures, and dioramas.

They had a great raffle as well, and kept refilling the table as kits were selected. Classic Plastic Model Club 2025 Toy Drive

Hi guys, so here are the numbers for the toy drive.

First off, Tammy did a super fantastic job on the toy shopping. She did the usual price match thing at the check out at Target, on-line verses store price. She then watched daily for on-sale items for already purchased toys and went back and got the new sale prices and we were reimbursed the difference.

A few friends and members also purchased toys on their own. My sister and Eddie Arrajj both donated to the fund but wanted those funds to be used toward a bicycle; which we did buy. Rosemarie donated an item on her own as did Tammy. After showing the bike on Facebook, Dave Perkins contacted me to see if I could get a girls 26 inch bike to go with the boy's bike and he would pay for it. We were able to do so. Dave also donated six new model kits. Eddie also donated additional toys to go with the toy drive items.

We had a heavy hitter this year, especially with Bob Gagne donating \$500 and a model truck kit. Others may have also donated significant amounts but I don't know who as they put it in the donation box anonymously.

Several members have also donated things that were raffled off at our 2025 meetings, which helped the toy drive noticeably. They were, Dave Perkins, Joe Baril, Mac Johnston, Eddie Arrajj and Dana Benoit. Also contributing by matching the monthly raffle last May was Paul Anagnostopoulos.

The numbers: 192 items with a value before sales and price adjustments, along with additional purchases from friends and members, was...are you ready? Over \$3500 value! The money we used from the club toy drive fund was \$2007.

So, minus expenses of \$75 for one month storage unit rental, the cost of the clear bags and after reimbursing Tammy for all our purchases (she used her credit card to buy the toys), and as long as there are no surprises when I close out the storage, we'll be starting the 2026 toy drive off with \$1014 in our fund.

Dave Smith from Toys-For-Local-Children was there to accept our donation. Dave is second-from-right in the above photo (he is standing next to Tammy).

I also want to mention that this was our 10th consecutive toy drive. Tammy and I started doing it in 2016, as a way to help

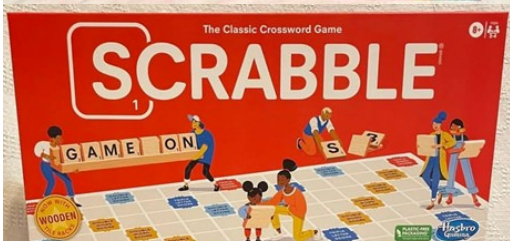
keep us busy in the holiday season after having lost my wife and her mother that year. Some may remember the club did a couple of small toy drives in the years prior to 2016.

Ten things I've learned...

Here are 10 things I've learned in 5 years.

- 1.) Organization. I hate to lose parts and it is so easy to do. I use leftover jars, little baggies and plastic storage boxes for parts storage the moment I remove them from the sprue, right through to sub-assemblies and final assembly.
- 2.) Take the stress off of parts when you remove them from the sprue. Consider cutting the sprue somewhere away from the part to take tension off of stressed pieces before making the cut near a part to release it. It sucks to damage a part before you even get a chance to work on it.
- 3.) Have you ever knocked over a bottle of paint? I have. Have you ever dropped a part into a bottle of paint? I have. Now I am diligent about putting paint lids and glue caps on ASAP! Also, when using adhesives, paints and solvents I put them in an aluminum tray when I use them. Just in case.
- 4.) Join a model car club.
- 5.) Keep your tape under wraps. Dust, dirt and debris can become stuck to the edges of tape if it is not kept in plastic bags or containers. Trying to keep a clean line when masking a model car body with dirty tape is futile.
- 6.) Good paint jobs require good lighting. I finally found a light I can mount inside my portable spray booth. It's a huge improvement and makes spraying a level paint job so much easier.
- 7.) Dust sucks. Before spraying paint, put a layer of damp (not wet) paper towels on the floor of your spray booth. Consider spraying antistatic aerosol in and around the booth before spraying paint. Use a blast of compressed air and a Tamiya anti-static brush on parts before spraying them.
- 8.) If you spray rattle-can paints buy a rattle-can "gun" handle at the hardware store and use it. It clips onto the can, has trigger action and provides much more control than the button on top of the can.
- 9.) Microfiber eyeglass cleaning cloths are now my go-to polishing cloths. They are soft, don't scratch, are inexpensive and readily available.
- 10.) Consider an apron. Wear it around your neck and then use Velcro to tack it to the bottom of your bench. You can catch a lot of parts that would otherwise fall to the floor.

Finally, a "bonus learning" tidbit, remember that perfection is an illusion.

Bit- Our Toy Drive has reached its goal and we are planning to start shopping next week with a drop off date to "Toys for Local Children" at the Tewksbury Fire Department. Thank you all very much who have donated to this wonderful cause.

Piece - Some of you long time members might remember Leo Soucy, a former member from around 10 years ago. He dropped by for a visit at the November meeting. No worries, the Sergeant with "Poison Pen" is no longer in the club.

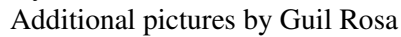

Ruane and I went to Fulton Model Show held the weekend before Thanksgiving in Fulton NY. Since it's a five hour drive, we decided to go out on Saturday and stay over for the Sunday show. On the way out, we decided to stop near Utica and visit HobbyTown Clinton. You may know the owners, Mike and Kim. They have vended at our show and at several others in MA over the last several years. Mike also has a You-Tube channel - Mike's Mods and Customs.

The store was awesome! They have a great selection of models (cars, military, Gundam) and all the modeling supplies you'll need. They have a lot of different brands of paint and carry MCV 3D printed engines and wheels. They also have a really cool selection of craft supplies. I bought a Rolife kit, which I will bring to show and tell when I complete it. I highly recommend that if you are in the Utica area, you check it out.

The show is held at the Volney Fire Station. It's a great set up as they have a large room with a kitchen attached. That's where the models were displayed. This year, they had leg extenders on their tables. Categories were all car and truck related, with one miscellaneous category. Their show theme is a separate category, which this year was Hemi's. This category was very full.

The quality of the builds was amazing and the competition was very stiff. I did not envy the judges as their job was difficult. There were only three judges for the entire show, but fewer categories than most shows. There was a contingent of modelers from our friends in the Newburg, NY model group. Other than us, Randy Catudal finally made it to the show. There were also a few friends from You-Tube. It was also great to have some of our modeler friends from Canada make the trip as well.

The vendor area was in the attached garage area (they had moved the fire trucks out for the day). There were a lot of vendors and the area was rather tight. There was a quite a variety of big rig kits and car kits from new to vintage ones. The Detail Master ladies were there again with a large display.

Fire station personnel prepared food for breakfast and lunch. They had great options available and the food was not only delicious but piping hot.

As I said, the competition was stiff, but Ruane did win a plaque for his Honda Trail 70.

As we drove to the show Sunday morning the snow started falling. The temp was in the 40's so we figured there was no danger of accumulation, but we were in the land of lake effect snow. However we did drive home in lots of rain, but eventually drove out of it.

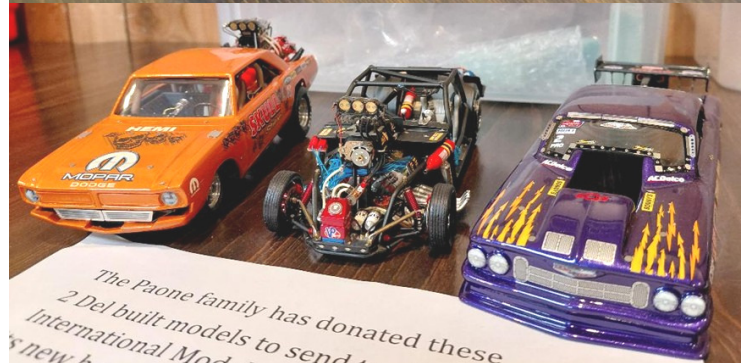
